#### 1.RAMANATHAPURAM, TAMIL NADU

#### 1.1. BACKGROUND - ABOUT THE DISTRICT:

Ramanathapuram District is an administrative district of TamilNadu state in Southern India. The city of Ramanathapuram is the District Head Quarters.Ramanthapuram District has an area of 4175 Sq.kms. It is bound by Sivaganga District in the North, by Pudukkottai District in the North-East, by the Palk Strait on the East, by the Gulf of Mannar on the South, by Thoothukudi District on the West, and by Virudhunagar District on the North-West. The district contains the Pamban Bridge, an east-west chain of low islands and shallow coral reefs that extend between India and the island nation of Sri Lanka, and separate the Palk Strait from the Gulf of Mannar.

The district is divided into nine revenue division with Ramanathapuram town as its headquarters. It has four municipalities, seven Town panchayats and 400 Revenue villages. Rural Development Programmes of the government are implemented through 11 administrative blocks (Panchayat unions) and 429 village administrative bodies (Panchayats) with 2362 hamlets.

It has 11 Hospitals, 14 Arts & Science Colleges, 4Engg. Colleges, 112High Schools & 143 Higher Secondary Schools run by the Government and Private respectively. The entire district covers an area of 4175 sqkmtrs. The national and state highways together cover a length of 389 kms in the district. Rameswaram a coastal town is a legendary pilgrim center for Hindus.

"The Waterless forest" as widely known Ramanathapuram district lies in the southeast coastal district of Tamilnadu, India. This goes to say that the district is drought prone for the greatest part of the year. Nature of the land is mostly flat and sandy. Due to lack of irrigation, agriculture depends only on rain water, which is very low and scarce. The three major reservoirs too suffer scarcity of water almost throughout the year. Palmyrah trees which thrive in this climatic condition are the only species found abundantly in this district. Recent days "KaruOdoi" (Prosopisjuliflora) tree variety

brought to meet the fuel need of the rural people is encroaching most of the areas and adding up to the condition still further.

#### 1.2 DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE OF THE DISTRICT

According to 2011 census, Ramanathapuram district had a population of 1,353,445 with a sex-ratio of 983 females for every 1,000 males, much above the national average of 930. A total of 140,644 were under the age of six, constituting 96,420 males and 44,224 females. Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes accounted for 18.4% and .01% of the population respectively.

The average literacy of the district was 72.32%, compared to the national average of 74.04%. The district had a total of 323,905 households. There were a total of 602,977 workers, comprising 173,767 cultivators, 60,874 main agricultural labourers, 25,228 in house hold industries, 343,108 other workers, 116,827 marginal workers, 15,362 marginal cultivators, 48,476 marginal agricultural labourers, 7,994 marginal workers in household industries and 15,298 other marginal workers.

The literacy rate is72.32% in general in while rural level is 69.15% and female 45.20%. Muslim, Chettiar, Reddiar, Nayakkar, Thevar, Nadar, Meenavar, Yadavar, Pallar, Paraiyar and Chakilliyar from the major caste groups in the district. Of these 77.39% are Hindus, 6.73% are Christians and 15.37% are Muslims by religion. The main occupations are Fishing, Agriculture, Palmyrah Tapping Petty trades and business. The traditional land tenure system in the villages has lead large number of people to marginal and landless labourers. About 80% of the land holding is with 5% of the rich in rural areas. Besides, this district does not have any big job-oriented industries. Among the existing 12 small level factories, three are more or less paralyzed. Employment opportunity, on the whole, is very low. This tends migration of the people to other parts of the country as well as abroad that adds up to other health related issues like Tuberculosis, Sexually Transmitted Infections, HIV etc.,

#### 1.3. ABOUT THE ORGANISATION AND THE COMMUNITIES

AIRD was founded in the year 1991 to improve the conditions of Palmayrah workers and other excluded and vulnerable communities in Ramanathapuram district. Keeping its mission, AIRD has been instrumental in capacitating and organising them to access the mainstream services. Over the years, AIRD has been successful in forming and equipping theRamanathapuram District Palmayrah Workers' Federation to function independently as a registered body to protect their rights and work for their development.

AIRD subsequently commenced work with Rural Artisans through a Network intervention programme in 1996 called NEERA (Network for Education and Empowerment of Rural Artisans) and reached out to the communities in 30 Panchayats of Ramanathapuram and Thoothukudi Districts. This initiative entailed working through women groups as a strategy in reaching the goal of the overall programme, which was to promote self-help through a community organisation process, equip the communities with awareness generation and capacity building, and enable the community to create access to resources by linking with mainstream players. Through the efforts made, we got a programme through a NEERA Network, focused on four major components namely: Access to Primary Health Care, Increasing Income Generation Options, and Greater Participation of Community in Local Governance & Strengthening of Federation to enhance Community Competency.

This NEERA initiative enabled AIRD to address many of the community issues and equip the communities to be a partner in development as opposed to treating them as mere recipients of project benefits. This in fact has enabled the communities to sustain the efforts to date.

AIRD implemented a Community Based Care and Support programme for HIV/AIDS in the district. This was an alliance of 22 NGOs in Tamilnadu supported by International HIV/AIDS Alliance, UK. AIRD implemented CRL (Climate change responses, Risk reduction, and Livelihood promotion) programme in Ramanathapuram district with 12 NGO partners from 2012 to 2014. The programme focused on sustainable agriculture, renewable energy, micro insurance, microfinance and social enterprises.

Besides, the organization has also been implementing a Targeted Intervention for Female Sex Workers (TI FSW) program since 2008 with the support of National AIDS Control Organization (NACO), New Delhi through Tamil Nadu State AIDS Control Society (TANSACS), Chennai. The core objective of this program is to identify Female Sex Workers, ensuring safe sex practices through use of condom, increasing their health seeking behavior by periodical health check-up especially for Sexually Transmitted Infections (STI), taking continuous treatment and also motivating the partners through them for treatment have been ensured with most of the people identified.

Subsequently AIRD went through difficult circumstances due to various internal and external anomalies beyond its control effective 2014. This included the changing donor priorities and their perceptions about India and particularly TamilNadu. Also, there had been an effort to restructure the board with the view to strengthen its competence both in terms of coping with emerging demands and skill sets.

As a result, AIRD is on to a new phase of its development efforts. This also means that the organisation has to reconsider its mandate and programmes. Consequent to this, AIRD has the TANSACS program as its anchor initiative and is gradually working on a Farmers initiative, besides some community based micro enterprises and establishing Off Farm Producer Organizations are being thought through and are likely to be grounded during the ensuing year 2020-21.

#### 2. MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS OF AIRD DURING 2020-21

It has been a trustworthy Organization working with the communities it strives to serve, develop and also the donor communities which have been supporting it.

Following major activities were carried out during the year for the communities with their active participation:-

2.1. TARGETED INTERVENTION AMONG FEMALE SEX WORKERS

(TI - FSW)

This TI – FSW programme is implemented among Female Sex Workers (FSWs) with

the funding support from Tamil Nadu State AIDS Control Society, Chennai from the

year 2008 onwards. The core objective of this program is to identify Female Sex

Workers, ensure their safe sex practices through the use of condom, increasing their

health seeking behavior by periodical health check-up especially for Sexually

Transmitted Infections (STI), encouraging them taking continuous treatment and also

motivating the partners for counselling, testing and treatment (if necessary) have been

ensured with the majority of the people identified.

TANSACS project which has been carried out over the past 12 years effectively by

AIRD has also resulted in the institution performing well among the NGOs falling under

Madurai Region.

The shortage in the performance of Reporting Year compared to the previous year is due to the COVID-1 pandemic and the lockdown resulting in the lesser performance in the coverage of the target.

### 2.1.(ii).MAJOR THRUST AREAS OF TARGETED INTERVENTION AMONG FSWs IN PREVENTING STI / HIV ARE:

Making the FSWs undergo STI/HIV testing through referral and linkage twice in a year, i.e., once in 6 months.

- (a) Making the HRGs undergo Regular Medical Check-up (RMC) once in a quarter i.e., four times a year by physically accompanying them to STI Clinic in Government facilities.
- (b) Distribution of Condoms among HRGs through Peer Educators (PEs) to promote safer sex and to prevent the spread of STI /HIV from Partners to HRGs and vice versa.
- **(c)** Ensuring the availability of Social Marketing Condoms at the TI Project Office for the use of clients who visit HRGs opting for priced / commercial condoms.

# 2.1.(iii).DISTRIBUTION OF FREE NUTRITIVE FOOD ITEMS PACK TO THE PEER EDUCATORS AND A PLHIV, MOBILISED FROM DEEN SUPER MARKET,THANGACHIMADAM

On account of Religious Festival and as a token of providing Nutritional support to the 14 Peer Educators and a PLHIV in our Follow-up who are poor and downtrodden in their economic aspect, 15 No. of Free Nutritive Food Items Packs each worth Rs.400/- were issued to 14 Peer Educators and a PLHIV, totaling 15 women members on 21/11/2020. The training programme on **programmatic Mapping & Population Size Estimation (p-MPSE)** was conducted at our AIRD office for the Peer Educators of our TI-FSW Project on the dates of 27<sup>th</sup> & 28<sup>th</sup> of Nov.2020.

At the inaugural session, **Dr.Mohamed Esoof,Public Health Consultant** delivered an inaugural talk indicating the importance of p-MPSE and the role of Peer Educators and the Out Reach Workers in identifying new Hot spots and collecting the accurate data from the newly identified Hot spots with High Risk Population in the field giving certain clues to do the Mapping process based on the basis of the guidelines provided to them.



### 3. <u>MATTERS DISCUSSED AT THE DEVELOPMENT WORKERS</u> REVIEW MEETINGS DURING THE YEAR 2020-21

 Conducting Survey for SELCO related to Villages / Schools with Low Voltage electricity or No electricity facility.

- Collecting details and preparing a List of SHGs to be submitted at ICICI Bank for empanelment towards availing credit facility for SHGs under Micro Finance Scheme.
- Preparing and linking 50 SHGs for availing credit facility from ICICI Bank.
- Increasing Deposits for Micro Finance Scheme of Deepam SHGs Federation and streamlining Micro Finance Scheme to make it profitable.
- Collecting details related to Farmers and Crops cultivated from Thiruppullani Block to make attempts for initiating Farmers Producer Oganisation / Company (FPO/C) with the Fund assistance from NABARD.
- Collecting data from working villages on locally available resources, household occupation, crops grown, electricity facility, schools etc.,
- Formation of new SHGs in the operational area.
- Enhancing the activities of SHGs related to Deposits and Lending by promoting New SHGs.
- Development Workers to organise Cluster level meetings and increase Deposits for Micro Finance Scheme of Deepam SHG Federation.
- Development Workers to encourage prospective entrepreneurs trained in Jute and Cloth Bags making to do Udyam Registration by producing required documents which will help them avail Bank loan, Subsidy through Distict Industries Centre for starting Enterprising Units under MSME Scheme.
- The Director asked the Development Workers to enquire about the current selling rate of the Deepam SHG Federation's Land in Kilakarai (on Main Road side) route after Thiruppullani as it has been proposed to dispose it off to meet out the loss and to make up and fill the gaps in Deepam Federation implemented Micro Finance Scheme.
- As the Development Workers have got only 20 and / or few more SHGs per head on their hold and under their supervision, on the basis of previous history of Monitoring fee collection from SHGs, the Development Workers were instructed by the Director that each Development Worker must collect and remit atleast Rs.1,000/- per head at the office as Monitoring Fee collection.
- As the Bankers are asking for NOC from the newly formed JLGs and demanding Rs.500/- to Rs.1000/-,for providing NOC and for considering their JLG to sanction the Loan, the concerned Development Workers informed the Director about it and

further shared that the JLG members express that they are not willling to pay bribe to the Bankers for getting the NOC and for obtaining Bank loan.

- As it was observed that, the Loan disbursement and recovery shows a down hill
  course while looking at the Financial Report of the past Three Years, it was
  resolved to share the plight of the Micro Finance Scheme with the Office bearers
  of the Federation to decide on the rectification measures and to proceed further
  on the next course of action.
- The Development Workers were instructed to collect the Deposit and Loan due details of SHGs who have joined and left and still contiuing as existing members in the Micro Finance Scheme of the Federation to assess the exact status of the same.

#### 4. FUTURE PLANS

AIRD desires to widen its interventions during the ensuing years with a strengthened community base that enables them to shift towards collective functioning. The focus areas would be promotion of Farmers Producer Organisations, Climate Change Mitigation, Food Security and Livelihood adopting business through entrepreneurial initiatives and Micro-financing.

AIRD in this process would strive to work with women, farmers, children and youth.In addition,the organization will also make attempts to create sustainable community structures with suitable mainstream linkages.
